



Nature Notes

What a year we are having for Primroses!

They are so good every year but for the force of nature this winter seems to have provided the ideal conditions.

I have seen them in so many different places, locally on the banks of White Hill, Mill Lane, my own garden and now on plot 1 of the rewilding scheme. Earlier this week I had cause to walk around Boughton under Blean whilst my vehicle was being fixed and they were there in abundance on the banks of the A2, clearly on made up ground from the time of the roads construction that gives me hope.

Primroses are surprise, surprise members of the primula family. The Latin name for them is Primula Vulgaris meaning common, they must have been numerous when the list was compiled. Their closest relative is the Cow Slip Primula Verdi's, sadly, much less common now.

Primroses are an important food source for brimstone butterflies (they are the greeny/ yellow ones that are some of the earliest to emerge from winter hibernation) and bumble bees. The seeds of primroses are often spread by ants, who carry them off to store in their nests, they are a long lived plant and can be spread by us gardeners also by splitting the clumps up after flowering.

The spring is progressing slowly this year due to the cold nights but this is good as we do not want a burst of cold weather to follow a warm spell as this is not good for wildlife. That said we have been watching a pair of blackbirds in our garden who thrilled us by laying their first egg in their beautifully crafted nest this week. But still no swallows nor a cuckoo, however the BTO advise us this week that one of their tracker birds had reached the Iberian Peninsula on its way to us from W Africa. We hope he gets here and reminds us of a familiar sound when we were young.



Amnesty International celebrates 60 years

Amnesty International was founded in London 60 years ago, on 28th May 1961.

A non-governmental organisation with its headquarters in the United Kingdom, Amnesty International focuses on human rights and is believed to have more than seven million members and supporters around the world. It was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1977 for its "defence of human dignity against torture".



Amnesty came together following the publication of an article in The Observer, 'The Forgotten Prisoners', by Peter Benenson, a Jewish lawyer whose mother Flora Benenson was Russian. His father Harold Solomon was British, but he died when Peter was nine. Peter, who was tutored by W H Auden and went to Eton and Balliol, took his mother's name much later as a tribute to his grandfather, a gold tycoon.

With a group of lawyers and as a member of the Labour Party he also founded Justice, the influential human rights and law reform organisation, in 1957, but the following year he fell ill and moved to Italy to convalesce, where he converted to Roman Catholicism.

Amnesty campaigns to put pressure on governments where human rights abuse takes pace. It considers capital punishment to be "the ultimate, irreversible denial of human rights."





All in the Month of May

200 years ago, on 5th May 1821 that Napoleon Bonaparte, Emperor of France (1804 – 1815) died of stomach cancer. He was in exile on the island of Saint Helena in the South Atlantic, aged 51.

175 years ago, on 30th May 1846 that Peter Carl Fabergé was born. This Russian goldsmith and jeweller was best known for his fabulously decorated Fabergé eggs.

150 years ago, on 11th May 1871 that John Herschel, British astronomer, mathematician, chemist and pioneering photographer died. Amongst other things, he named seven of Saturn's moons and investigated colour blindness. He was also President of the Royal Astronomical Society three times.

100 years ago, on 3rd May 1921 that Ireland was divided into Northern Ireland and Southern Ireland (now known as the Republic of Ireland).

100 years ago, on 15th May, that the British Legion was founded.

90 years ago, 1st May 1931 The Empire State Building, New York City was opened

80 years ago, on 1st–7th May 1941 that the German Blitz on Liverpool left nearly 3,000 dead and 70,000 homeless. Liverpool was the 2nd most targeted British city.

80 years ago, on 10th May 1941 the last major Blitz attack on London caused heavy damage to many important buildings, including the Houses of Parliament, St James Palace, Westminster Abbey, Lambeth Palace, several railway stations and hospitals, the British Museum and the Old Bailey. More than 1,300 people were killed on one night. During the Blitz, London was bombed for 57 nights in a row.

75 years ago 11th May 1946 first CARE packages for Europe arrived in Le Havre to help people starving after WWII. They were actually surplus US Army rations

70 years ago, on 3rd May 1951 that the Festival of Britain and the Royal Festival Hall in London were opened. The aim of the Festival was to lift the nation's spirits by celebrating British industry, arts and science.

70 years ago, on 9th May 1951 that the Lake District National Park was established.

70 years ago, on 25th May 1951 that the British spies Guy Burgess and Donald Maclean fled to Moscow. They were members of the infamous Cambridge spy ring, and their whereabouts remained unknown until 1956.

60 years ago, on 28th May 1961 that Amnesty International was founded in London.

40 years ago, on 13th May 1981 that Pope John Paul II was shot and seriously wounded by a Turkish gunman in an assassination attempt in St Peter's Square.

30 years ago, on 16th May 1991 that Queen Elizabeth II became the first British monarch to address the US Congress.

25 years ago, on 30th May 1996 that Prince Andrew, Duke of York, and his wife Sarah, Duchess of York, were divorced.

20 years ago, on 7th May 2001 that Great Train Robber Ronnie Biggs returned to the UK from Brazil where he had lived as a fugitive for 36 years. He was immediately arrested and sent to prison to complete his sentence. Released on compassionate grounds in 2009, he died in 2013.

Urgent Treatment Centres

Urgent Treatment Centres are a relatively new NHS initiative and it can be confusing for patients to know when and how to use them. Historically there have been a number of alternatives such as Walk in Centres, Out of Hours Centres and Minor Injuries Clinics, with differing local names and offering different levels of service. The bewildered patient has often found it easier to go straight to A and E which is a service everyone understands. The plan, now, is that the commonality of Urgent Treatment Centre provision will offer greater clarity and simplify the system, so patients will know where and when to go.

The primary purpose of the Urgent Treatment Centre is to relieve the pressure on A&E Departments by treating minor injuries and illnesses that are urgent, but not life threatening.

For example - Sprains and strains, suspected broken limbs, minor head injuries, cuts and grazes, bites and stings, minor scalds and burns, ear and throat infections, eye problems, coughs and colds, feverish illness in adults, feverish illness in children, abdominal pain, vomiting and diarrhoea and emergency contraception.

Clearly if the illness is an emergency and life threatening you should dial 999.

Our nearest Urgent Treatment Centre is at the William Harvey Hospital and it operates 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, including bank holidays. The centres are led by GPs and are equipped to diagnose and deal with many of the most common ailments for which people attend A&E.

If you are in doubt, the best thing is to call NHS 111 or go to www.111.nhs.uk. They will be able to direct you to the most appropriate service and will also be able to cut down on your waiting time by booking an appointment ahead of your arrival.

Important Reminder to Update Patient Details.

If you have moved or changed your landline, mobile number or email address, please remember to update the patient details held on you at the Surgery. Do this, too, if the details about your next of kin or who to contact in an emergency have changed.

If your details are not up to date, you may miss a call about a vaccine appointment or, in a worst case scenario, an ambulance could be sent to the wrong address in an emergency, when time is critical.

How to keep ground coffee fresh

The battle rages: just where IS the best place to store your ground coffee?

Sainsburys, Morrisons, Asda, Marks & Spencer and Ocado are among the supermarkets that advise you keep fresh ground coffee in a fridge or freezer after opening.

But Tesco, Waitrose and Harrods advise that you store ground coffee and beans in a cool, dry place such a kitchen cupboard.

Many coffee experts warn that storing your coffee in the fridge is wrong because coffee easily absorbs aroma, moisture and flavours, and can be tainted by fish, meat and cheese.

Martin Isark, founder of the Can I Eat It website, laments: "So much coffee is spoilt by poor storage, which makes the coffee producers want to weep..."

Paul Rooke of the British Coffee Association adds: "Coffee, like many food and drink products when exposed to air, will deteriorate. Cool and dry are the key words; the ideal storage is in an inert, airtight container stored in a cool place."

Is there life without the BBC?



Could you live happily without the BBC? Just try it for two weeks.

That was the recent challenge of the corporation's outgoing chairman, Sir David Clementi, to a group of critics who said they resented the licence fee.

Apparently, 9 days later, two thirds of the critics had changed their mind & said that the licence was worth every penny. Sir David observed that when "things that they took for granted are removed from them, they realise how valuable the BBC is."

So he encourages anyone else who thinks that the license is not worth £3 a week, to try life without the BBC. "I think that most people would find it very hard to cope."

Beware the use-by date

Nobody likes to throw food away, but if you ignore the use by dates and go by smell alone, you can risk serious illness.

So warns the Food Standards Agency. In a recent study, the regulator found that half of us do not always check use-by dates.

Many of us still smell the milk to see if it is still okay, even Theresa May, the former Prime Minister, has admitted to scraping the mould off jam in order to cut waste.

The agency has warned that some Britons who actively ignore use-by dates could risk being hospitalised. Use-by dates are carefully calculated by assessing bacteria on food which could multiply to make them ill.

A spokesman for the agency said: "It's great that consumers are trying to minimise food waste, but there are lots of ways to do that without gambling with your health, such as planning your meals ahead of time, checking what you have in the fridge that is close to its use-by date, and freezing food right up until the use-by dates."

Sadly, there are around 2.4 million cases of food poisoning each year & 180 deaths.

Climate Change is Happening

Pat Crawford provides the Rural Focus Press Group Comment & Advice Column

A.C.Goatham and Son, the UK's largest top fruit producers (primarily apples and pears) with 25 farms located throughout Kent, have installed one of the UK's largest solar panel systems using existing roof space at two of the company's farms. The energy generated will be sufficient to power all the company's cold storage and packing facilities.

According to research based at Oxford University and led by the university's Economic Recovery Project and the Global Recovery Observatory together with the United Nations Environment Programme, countries around the world are falling short of commitments to 'build back better' after the Covid 19 pandemic; only 18% of recovery spending going towards 'green investment'. An analysis of pandemic - related fiscal policies of 50 leading economies concludes that, of the \$46 trillion (that is \$46 thousand billion) expended last year, a mere \$386 billion could be considered green and sustainable that is less that 0.85%


Five Technical Working Groups are preparing a global roadmap designed to achieve the seventh Sustainable Development Goal (SDG 7); affordable and clean energy for all by 2030 and net-zero emissions by 2050. According to the UN, energy consumption is responsible for three-quarters of all greenhouse gas emissions. The Global Champion Ministers are tasked with galvanizing voluntary commitments towards achieving SDG 7 and long-term climate goals aligned to the 2014 Paris Climate Change Agreement.

Morrison's has announced its intention 'to be completely supplied by Net Zero Carbon (**NZC**) British farms by 2030'. The supermarket intends launching NZC eggs in 2022 followed by beef in 2025.

CCS – carbon capture and storage – promoted by the UN – involves capturing emissions resulting from major industrial processes or the burning of fossil fuels in power generation and then transporting the carbon (ship or pipeline) to be stored deep underground in geological formations. The idea is not new but it has risen up the UN agenda as time begins to run out to deliver on the Paris Agreement.










Puzzle Solutions

Emails

Emails are a great way of communicating. You can send a message to someone in the same village or across the world almost instantly. Lawyers always ask, "have you got evidence in writing?" Telephone calls or face to face conservations are still evidence but it is difficult to prove what was said. Conversations are recorded so you can see the chain of who said what and when. Emails are quick and free.

Emails can, however, easily be harmful. You can accidentally send a personal or private message to the wrong person or even worse copy it to lots of people. It is also difficult to judge the tone of an email, whether it is light-hearted or serious, cross or joyful. It is very easy to insult or upset someone because a remark you make that "sounds" funny in your head actually come across completely differently to the person reading it.

It was to try to combat these misunderstandings that they invented "emoticons" and "emoji" a more enhanced version. An emoticon short for "emotion icon", also known simply as an emote, is a pictorial representation of a facial expression using characters—usually punctuation marks, numbers, and letters—to express a person's feelings, mood or reaction, or as a time-saving method. Early emoticons were the precursors to modern emoji's, which are ever-developing predominantly on iOS and Android devices. The first ASCII emoticons, :-) and :-(, were written by Scott Fahlman in 1982, but emoticons actually originated on the PLATO IV computer system in 1972. Nowadays they are built into most operating systems and your phone would more likely use actual Emoji graphic pictures or they convert the text to ASCII pictures. For example if you type :) it will print © this is the ASCI version compared to the Emoji smiley face.

When we are on the telephone or speaking face to face it is easier to tell whether the speaker is feeling angry or light-hearted.




Sometimes we need a break. Emails are good


Some discussions are better face to face, and always double check who you are sending it to or copying to.


