Dear Friends,

Run with perseverance the race marked out for us

Love them or hate them, it has been impossible to ignore the Olympics. In the many weeks leading up to the games I must admit, I wasn't particularly interested, but when the games started, I was hooked. I wanted to know how the athletes were performing, and couldn't help but admire their determination, their stoicism and their faith – especially given the extraordinary lead up to the games that all the athletes had experienced during Covid and lockdowns. In spite of everything, they had trained and prepared their bodies and minds as well as they could, without any promise of a medal at the end of the games.

The athletes punish their bodies to run a gruelling marathon race, to row, swim or run thousands of metres or to compete in one of the many other events. They have the discipline to get out of bed at 4.00 or 5.00am to get into the swimming pool and swim hundreds of lengths or run around a track before going to work or school for a full day's work, only to return to the pool or track in the evening, and to repeat this process day after day after day. They run their races with perseverance.

Living a life of faith is rather like training for the Olympics, and it is equally as difficult, but great prizes also await those who persevere. In this race however, no one loses. If you finish, you get the reward, you don't have to win a gold, silver or bronze medal for God to know and applaud everyone who crosses the finishing line.

In the book of Hebrews, we are told that: "Faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see." (11:1) and the reading goes on to list just some of the actions that faithful people have undertaken. The chapter then finishes with: "These were all commended for their faith, yet none of them received what had been promised. God had planned something *better* for us so that only together with us would they be made perfect. (Heb 11:39-40).

We don't have to come first or win medals for God to give us the prize, because we have already been given the prize, even if we don't recognise it as such. And the prize? God gave his Son, Jesus Christ, that we might live.

So often it's the things that we don't do that we regret, only to find it's suddenly too late to do anything about it. Just like the athletes, as people of faith, we are encouraged to "run with perseverance the race marked out for us." So let us take action now and begin training for a life of faith and if you aren't sure about where to start, how about starting with the following prayer: "Help me, Lord, to do now what I will wish I had done when I come to the end of the way."

Zebra crossings – saving lives for 70 years

70 years ago, 31st October 1951 zebra crossings were introduced officially in the UK

The crossings had been trialled over two years at 1000 experimental sites, but in 1951 the black & white striped pedestrian crossings & orange lights were approved, all drivers were required by law to stop as soon as a pedestrian set foot on them.

The first one was in Slough, Berkshire and was the brainchild of Yorkshireman and traffic engineer George 'Dr Zebra' Charlesworth, a physicist who had worked on the Barnes Wallis-designed bouncing bomb during the war. His zebra crossings were certainly responsible for saving many lives.

All in the Month of October

500 years ago, on 11th Oct 1521 that Pope Leo X granted the title 'Defender of the Faith' to King Henry VIII of England and Ireland. It recognised the King's defence of the sacrament of marriage, the supremacy of the Pope, and his opposition to the Protestant Reformation and the ideas of Martin Luther. The title has been inherited by British monarchs since then.

250 years ago, on 17th Oct 1771 that the premiere of Mozart's pastoral opera, Ascanio in Alba, took place in Milan, Italy. Mozart was then aged 15.

150 years ago, from 8th to 10th Oct 1871, that the Great Chicago Fire took place. About 300 people were killed, over three square miles of the city was destroyed, & around 100,000 people made homeless. Also was the Peshtigo Fire of Wisconsin – burned 1,200,000 acres & killed 2,500 people – the deadliest wildfire in US history.

125 years ago, 3rd Oct 1896 that William Morris, British textile designer, pot novelist and socialist, died. Known for his association with the Arts and Crafts Movement.

90 years ago, on 24th Oct 1931 that the George Washington Bridge was opened. It spans the Hudson River and links Manhattan to Fort Lee, New Jersey.

Looking to the future - The Health and Social Care bill

We are still in the middle of a pandemic, waiting lists have topped 5.3 million and in addition to the usual winter pressures (flu vaccination will be particularly vital after low exposure last year), there will be the additional demands of Covid booster jabs for the over fifties. It has to be questioned whether this is the time to introduce a bill which will herald yet another major reorganisation of the NHS. On the other hand, the legislation that integrates medical and Social Care services currently going through Parliament is long overdue. The main question for patients, therefore, is how will all this affect me?

Separation of Health and Social Care happened in 1970 and has been problematic ever since. Local authorities were made responsible for organising and funding continuing care services through the newly formed generic social services departments. Since then, the chronic dysfunction of the interface between health and social care has resulted in many hospital patients ready for discharge being stranded in an administrative hinterland, waiting to be assessed before being transferred to residential care homes. Anything that can streamline that process should be welcomed, but there is devil in the detail that should concern patients.

The amalgamation of Health and Social Care is to be achieved through the abolition of the Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCGs), who are currently responsible for commissioning all GP services. On the current timetable, from April 2022 they will be replaced by new Integrated Care Centres (ICCs), who will be responsible for commissioning both Health and Social Care Services. The Bill gives government much greater central control and removes the obligation for the ICCs to commission health and social care services from solely NHS providers, thus opening the door to outsourcing contracts to private companies. In addition, the legislation as drafted does not reserve an automatic place on the ICC boards for patient representatives, as is the case for the present CCGs.

Over the last 18 months all NHS services have been stretched by the pandemic, but changes in the way GP services have been delivered have taken place without adequate patient consultation. The problems that this has caused highlight the need for a much greater level of patient participation when future decisions are taken about the delivery of services. After all, we are the ones on the receiving end.

Climate Change is Happening

Pat Crawford provides the Rural Focus Press Group Comment & Advice Column

The numbers of Extreme Weather Events have soared around the globe and Southern Europe experienced intense heatwaves with temperatures reaching an incredible 46 Celsius (115 Fahrenheit) in Greece. Wildfires have raged in parts of Europe devastating business premises forcing thousands of people to evacuate their homes. Whereas arson and natural causes such as lightening are to blame for starting the fires, extreme heat and parched earth are the main cause for the intensity of the fires and the cause of them spreading so rapidly. (By the beginning of August, at least 55% more area burned across Europe than averaged over the previous 12 years.) The scale of the fires caused high levels of particulate matter pollution, the persistent exposure to which is associated with cardiovascular diseases and lung cancer.

Next year it is possible that homeowners will be offered a grant of £7,000 to ditch their gas boiler. The Clean Heats Grant would form part of the government's endeavour to make the nation greener and more eco-friendly.

Regional UN energy experts are suggesting that finding solutions to reducing carbon emissions should involve building additional nuclear power stations. Meanwhile the use of hydrogen to provide energy is under increasing scrutiny; a kilogram of hydrogen provides something in region of three times as much energy as a comparable quantity of diesel or petrol. Most manufactured hydrogen is made by combining natural gas with steam at high temperatures, an energy-intensive process responsible for emitting considerable amounts of carbon. However, by splitting water into constituent elements by zapping it with electricity – electrolysis - - with the electricity needed provided by renewables, resulting overall harmful emissions would be minimal.

The UN's most recent climate report puts a great deal of emphasis on carbon removal; one problem being that this solution requires technologies that are in their infancy.

A 10 year old girl has launched a petition asking the Department for Education to introduce an annual fundraising day for animals in schools across the country.

Bailey Woozeer proposes that World Animal Day, held annually on October 4, would be an ideal opportunity for schools to support both British and international animal welfare charities through events such as non-uniform days.

Schools and animal welfare organisations have quickly given the idea a 'phenomenal' response, and her petition has attracted over 27,000 signatures.

Bailey, from Doncaster, said: "Why are the nationwide fundraising days always about helping humans? Animals are desperate and suffering and many species are nearly extinct. They need our help. Please sign and share my petition, because one school fundraising day a year, for the animals around our planet, is something that should already be happening."

Like most charities, animal welfare organisations have faced a financial crisis during the past 15 months. Their income has been hit by a lack of fundraising events due to social distancing guidelines, charity shop closures during lockdown and donors reassessing their priorities.

Puzzle Solutions



Halloween celebrations have their roots with the Celtic peoples of pre-Christian times.

In those long-ago days, on the last night of October, the Celts celebrated the Festival of Samhain, or 'Summer's End'. The priests, or Druids, performed ceremonies to thank and honour the sun. For there was a very dark side to all this: Samhain also signalled the onset of winter, a time when it was feared that unfriendly ghosts, spirits, & witches roamed the earth, creating mischief. So the Druid priests lit great bonfires and performed magic rites to ward off or appease these dark supernatural powers.

Then the Romans arrived, and brought their Harvest Festival which honoured the Goddess Pomona with gifts of apples and nuts. The two festivals slowly merged.

When Christianity arrived still later, it began to replace the Roman and Druid religions. 1st November - All Saints' Day - was dedicated to all Christian Martyrs and Saints who had died. It was called 'All Hallows' Day'. The evening before became an evening of prayer and preparation and was called 'All Hallows' Eve', The Holy Evening, later shortened to 'Halloween'.

For many centuries, however, fear of the supernatural remained strong. During the Middle Ages, animal costumes and frightening masks were worn to ward off the evil spirits of darkness on Halloween. Magic words and charms were used to keep away bad luck, & everybody believed that witches ride about on broomsticks. Fortune telling was popular, and predicting the future by the use of nuts and apples was so popular that Halloween is still sometimes known as Nutcrack Night or Snap-Apple Night.

Internet Domains

This may not be of interest to everyone but I thought I would spend some time looking at the way the Internet domain system works for those who have their own business and have either bought or thought of buying their own domain for a website and email.

How does it Work

The internet domain system is used to translate the numbers used by computers into a name understood by



people. Therefore www.google.co.uk is from a computers point of view a numeric address (called an IP address). The domain system works in a very similar way to a postal address, it is actually used backwards. "We don't user postal addresses backwards" I hear you say, well we do, *Canterbury Road, Challock, Ashford, Kent* is used by the post office as, send the letter to Kent, then the Ashford sorting office where they say it has to go to Challock and the postman knows it's Canterbury Road. The Internet domain system works in the same way, with www.google.co.uk the computer asks the "co.uk" server for the address of the "Google" server, then asks the Google server the address of the "www" website. This is a simplified version as there are ways for the computer to shortcut this process to speed up your Internet access.

How do I get My Own Domain?

It is easy to register your own domain, just think up a unique name, pay some money and it's yours (you have to pay every year or two to keep it). Then you have to "Host" it somewhere. This is the server on the Internet where your domain "lives". Most companies that offer domain registration also offer domain hosting. There is of course another thing you need to decide, are you going to register a .co.uk, a .com or any of a number of extensions. Your domain only has to be unique within it's extension so ABC.com is different from ABC.co.uk so you may find that the name you think of is not available on .com but is available on .co.uk, there are however certain rules some enforced some just suggested good practice. This is small list of the extensions you may be interested in:

- .com for companies, international but generally considered US based.
- .org For organisations, International, charities, non-profit etc (suggested)
- .co.uk UK companies but also International companies that trade in the UK
- .org.uk For organisations, International, charities, non-profit etc (suggested)
- .Itd.uk Only for UK Limited Companies (enforced)
- .biz For businesses, International (suggested)

.me.uk - For individuals for personalised web or email (suggested) I have maidens.me.uk which means I can give all my relatives an email address @maidens.me.uk but they are getting used up quickly.

Beware - We often see companies use a 3rd party to register their Domain for them only to find out they don't actually own the Domain because the 3rd party registered it in their name not the clients. You can check at www.whois-search.com
